Well, Punxsutawney Phil saw his shadow, so here's hoping he's wrong and we do NOT have 6 more weeks of winter!

With spring around the corner, I wanted to share a checklist to jump start your exterior spring cleaning projects.

Just a reminder that all the forms you need to get ABC approval for your outside projects are all on the TFHOA website https://tamarackfairways.org/.

Please make sure to fill the form out correctly and include ALL backup in the same email so your projects can be approved quickly.

REFRESH YOUR FRONT DOOR

The curb appeal of your home can really take a beating during the long winter months. Take a look at your front door. Are there any dings or scrapes that could use a touch up? Any wear and tear that needs to be addressed? Consider giving it a vibrant pop with a fresh coat of paint. HGTV has a fantastic gallery of some of the season's most popular colors for your front door.

While you're doctoring up your entryway, think about updating your door hardware, too. This might mean a simple style upgrade with one of Schlage's handlesets, available in a wide variety of designs and finishes to ensure that your front door is the perfect introduction to your home. WASH OFF THE FRONT PORCH

CHECK ROOF, SIDING, FOUNDATION FOR SIGNS OF WEAR AND TEAR

Spring Cleaning Reminder Checklist Tips for Exterior

Avoid Code Violations and Keep Our Property Values at a Premium

EXTERIOR PAINT

While you're spring cleaning, consider freshening

the face of your home with a new paint job. An updated color scheme can take your house from forgettable to the best on the block. The average exterior paint job lasts 10 years, so make sure it's done right. If your house doesn't require a full paint makeover, consider a touch-up, which can prolong the life of your siding and trim.

POWER WASH

Spruce up your home's exterior surface by power-washing the siding and windows. This also helps prevent the growth of mold and mildews that feed on grime. If you're worried about whether your homes exterior can handle the force that pressure-washing nozzles exert, hire a professional to do the work.

GUTTER MAINTENANCE

Your roofs drainage system diverts thousands of gallons of water a year from your homes exterior and foundation walls. This hardworking system merits a semiannual inspection. Clean and repair gutters and downspouts every spring before heavy rains begin and late in autumn after leaves have fallen.

SEASONAL CHANGE

Hit the garage to store or unpack seasonal items at the return of spring. Put snow shovels, salt, scrapers and other winter gear in an out-of-the-way storage spot to make room for garden tools and potting supplies.

OUTDOOR FURNITURE

Get ready for outdoor entertaining season by cleaning exterior furniture. Clean and repair furniture on your deck, porch, or patio, including chairs, tables, and benches. Use outdoor spray enamel to touch up chips on painted outdoor furniture.

EXTERIOR AND INTERIOR WASH WINDOWS

Be sure to pick a cloudy day to wash your windows. Water and a microfiber cloth will typically clean windows more effectively than chemicals. Otherwise, make your own glass cleaner solution with 1/4 cup rubbing alcohol, 1/3 cup vinegar and distilled water.

SLIDING DOOR TRACKS

Sliding glass door tracks probably aren't the first spots you would think to clean, but you will appreciate having done it before the outdoor entertaining season gets into full swing. Scrubbing the tracks with an old, dry toothbrush to loosen debris, then using your vacuum hose to remove it. Finish with a wet sponge.

THE MOST COMMON CODE VIOLATIONS

Front and Backyard - It shall be unlawful for any owner or owners of any property, whether improved or unimproved, to allow the excessive accumulation of abandoned property, junk, trash or debris, and such accumulation is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and thereby prohibited in their front or backyard.

Examine your yards, and remove unnecessary rocks, twigs, branches, waste and other debris. Separate the debris into two piles: compostable and noncompostable. Compostable waste includes anything you can place in the compost pile, such as twigs, branches and fallen tree fruit. Non-compostable waste includes plastic, metal, junk, trash or debris and other nonbiodegradable items.

Check your yard daily for animal waste, and dispose of it as needed. Keeping a small, separate rubbish bin for animal waste minimizes odors in a yard and segregates the waste from household trash.

Accumulation of weeds, rubbish, etc. The word "weeds" as herein used shall include all rank of uncultivated vegetable growth or matter which:

1. Creates an unsanitary condition or becomes a breeding place for mosquitoes, rodents, vermin or other disease-carrying pest regardless of the height of the growth or;

2. Endangers property or is liable to be set on fire.

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All lawns should be free of weeds and debris, mowed, and appropriately kept up at all times under Tamarack Fairways Homeowners Associations Rules and Regulations page under the Wheatland Township Grass and Weed Ordinance.

The owner of the property on which the tree or shrub is growing is responsible for keeping the tree or shrub trimmed.

Garbage Cans

All garbage and garbage storage, equipment, materials, containers, landscape trimmings, tools, and scrap shall be screened from view at all times. Garbage cans can be brought out at 7 pm the night before pick-up and must be removed from the curb by 7 pm the day of pick-up. Please reference Tamarack Fairways Homeowners Associations Rules and Regulation page under Procedures Covering Garbage for further details.

Vehicles

Restrictions on vehicles parked at a residence: "Article I - "Section 7: The parking of any vehicle shall be restricted to only those vehicles small enough to be accommodated within the lots closed garage. Trailers, boats, mobile homes and other recreational vehicles may be parked outside of the garage on a lot for a period not to exceed seven days for maintenance or other purposes provided that these vehicles are removed completely from the property no later than the seventh day. The parking of restricted vehicles by visitors will be permitted for a period not to exceed seven days. In the event that a vehicle is abandoned on the streets within the Association, the Board has the authority to forward any relevant information to a local governmental entity to have the vehicle towed from the Association." Note: (The reference to the garage is only to determine the size of vehicles not quantity of vehicles parked in a driveway.)" Dilapidated or unrepaired and unsightly vehicles or similar equipment screened from view at all times. Please help keep our properties clean and safe so our property values go up!

Romance Scams

In 2021, the FBI reported approximately \$1 billion in losses from people falling victim to romance scams. Here in Naperville, we have seen monetary losses in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

How can you avoid being the victim of an online or romance scam? Know the signs of a con artist.

4 WAYS TO SPOT A ROMANCE SCAMMER

• They're quick to express their love. Their goal is to manipulate you, laying a foundation of lies and building your trust while

pulling at your heartstrings.

• They want you to move communication off any dating site to a more personal email or instant messaging platform.

• They always have an excuse for why you haven't met or talked face-to-face. Romance scammers plan to visit, but they always have an "emergency."

• They ask for money. They'll tell various lies about why they need the money that may include to visit you, hospital bills, family funeral expense, planning your wedding, investments, and any other type of emergency.

RECOGNIZE THE REG FLAGS (Source FBI)

• Be careful what you post and make public online. Scammers can use details shared on social media and dating sites to better understand and target you.

• Research the person's photo and profile using online searches to see if the image, name, or details have been used elsewhere.

• Go slowly and ask lots of questions.

• Beware if the individual seems too perfect or quickly asks you to leave a dating service or social media site to communicate directly.



BE ALERT! UTILITY COMPANY SCAMS

During the extremely cold weather in December, a Naperville resident was a victim of a Utility Scam and was burglarized. The resident was home when two men, one wearing a high visibility vest, knocked on the door. They advised the owner that she had a pipe burst in her basement and she let them in to check on her pipes. One burglar took her to the basement to view the pipes, while the other stole some jewelry.

This is a common Utility Scam that occurs as one will direct you away, while the other will burglarize your home. Utility companies will always have marked vehicles, they will have identification, and employees should never ask to come into your home without an appointment.

This is a good time to check up with all family members to talk about possible Utility Scams that might happen at the home. Whether it is a scam trying to get your personal information or money via telephone or internet, or an in-person scam, be alert.

Simply make sure that each 3x3 square region has only one instance of the numbers 1-9. Similarly, each number can only




