From the President

Spring has arrived and departed leaving us with light brown grass. Mother nature has let us down in providing enough rain to green up the lawns. Hopefully, the lawns will recover.

Our spring General Meeting was held on April 18 in the Clubhouse. It was not an official HOA meeting because we did not have a quorum of twenty-five properties. We discussed the status of our annual assessment of \$100 per homeowner. As of the meeting, 70 homeowners had not paid their HOA fees for 2023. It was also pointed out that 33% had not paid for 2023, 28% have not paid for 2 years, and there are 10 to 12 homes that have not paid in over 2 years.

We discussed upgrading the landscapes around our entrance way monuments. I deferred that project when we did not receive competitive responses to a Request for Proposal I sent out to local landscapers. The time needed to restart the process of requesting proposals and receive approval from the homeowners for the capital expense would end in June. I will restart this process in the fall and see if we can get the attention of the local landscaper.

We also announced at the meeting that Brad Cullen would be joining the HOA Board. Brad was a past member of the HOA Board, and we welcome him back. We still have another opening on the Board if you are interested.

Wheatland Township Highway Commissioner just gave me an update on their plans for the roads in Tamarack Fairways. In the July timeframe, they plan to resurface Wentworth Drive and Turnberry Court. In addition, they are planning to resurface the intersection of Royal Porthcawl Drive and Royal County Down Drive.

ZOMBIE COYOTES

Over the years there have been ever increasing reports in the suburbs of sick looking coyotes labeled as “Zombie Coyotes”.

The animals are often suffering from a contagious disease called sarcoptic mange and the ghoulish nickname comes from the condition’s effect on the behavior and appearance, including fur loss and skin problems. The infection also can affect the animal’s vision, prompting them to look for food in the daylight, a change in habit for these normally nocturnal animals.

It is important to note that this disease does not normally make the animal more violent. The condition is not normally life threatening to the coyote, but it can be spread to pets if they come in physical contact with an infected coyote. Pets can be successfully treated by a veterinarian in most cases.

Infected animals can transmit this infection to humans in rare cases, which is treatable.

Municipalities report a rise in this infection as the coyote population multiplies in suburban and urban areas. Mark Romano, a wildlife control specialist who has spoken to White Eagle residents, said, “The culprit is overpopulation. Although there are strategies to combat this, they are expensive, and most municipal agencies do not have the money to combat the disease”.

While this might sound like a setup for human-coyote conflicts, such situations haven’t created an increased risk for people. What it does do, however, is raise the visibility of the infected individual, which then triggers fear in people unaccustomed to coyote behavior problems.

Mange-ridden animals may seek shelter under raised decks or sheds, and they may attempt to forage for “easy” food like dishes of cat or dog kibble left out for outdoor pets. What they don’t do, as far as the research indicates, is make them any more dangerous than normal coyotes.

So, what should you do if you come snout to snout with a coyote, whether it is a standard issue or mange infected variety? While coyote attacks on humans are rare, the Cook County Project has these six tips:

1. Do not leave food outside for these animals or your pet. “Do Not Feed Them!”
2. Make sure you accompany your pets outside and not let them run loose.
3. Do not run from a coyote.
4. Repellents, loud noises, etc. can help repel these predators.
5. Report aggressive, fearless coyotes to Animal Control/local authorities.
6. Don’t create conflict.

WE ALL SHARE THE ROAD!

Whether you're out enjoying the sunshine in a vehicle, on a bicycle, or on foot, everyone has a responsibility to share the road safely. Here are some reminders for drivers, cyclists, walkers and runners.

TIPS FOR DRIVERS

Drivers are reminded to turn on vehicle headlights at dusk and be vigilant in looking out for cyclists and pedestrians. Additionally, drivers should:

- Stop for pedestrians at crosswalks.
- Slow down and obey the posted speed limit.
- Yield to pedestrians and cyclists when turning.
- Look before opening your door.
- Be careful when passing stopped vehicles.
- Allow three feet when passing bicyclists.

TIPS FOR CYCLISTS

When traveling on city streets, cyclists are required to follow the same rules of the road as motorists. This means stopping at stop signs, obeying traffic signals and lane markings, and using hand signals to let others know your intention to stop or turn. Additionally, cyclists should:

- Be aware of your surroundings. Don't wear headphones; you need to be able to hear if a car is approaching.
- Slow down and check for oncoming traffic before entering any street or intersection.
- Do your best to anticipate hazards and adjust your position in traffic accordingly.
- Be predictable: ride with the flow of traffic, on the right, and in a straight line – not in and out of parked cars on the side of the street.

- Be visible and wear the proper protective gear. Avoid riding at night.
- Make eye contact with motorists to let them know you are there (but don't always expect them to see you).

Bicycles may be ridden on the sidewalks in Naperville unless otherwise posted. However, bicycle riding is not permitted on sidewalks on the Riverwalk or in Downtown Naperville.

TIPS FOR WALKERS AND RUNNERS

Whether you're going for an afternoon stroll, commuting to work on foot, or getting some exercise, walking and running are great activities. However, it's important to pay attention. Pedestrians should keep the following tips in mind:

- Use signaled crosswalks when possible and use extreme caution when crossing at intersections without signals.
- Look both ways before crossing the street.
- Never run between cars into the street.
- Wear clothing that allows drivers to see you. That means no dark clothes after sundown or early in the morning.
- Exercising outdoors at dusk or at night can be dangerous without some type of reflective device on your clothing. Many athletic shoes have reflective qualities built in, but also consider a vest complete with reflective tape.
- Runners are also reminded to ALWAYS carry identification with them when they go out.

Remember no driver, bicyclist or pedestrian has sole right to the road. It is a shared space where we all have rights and responsibilities.

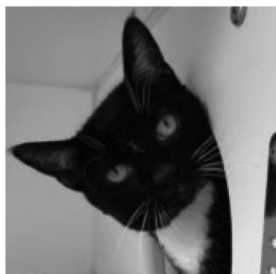

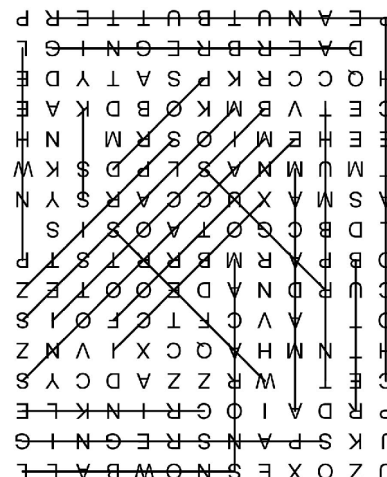

Growing your own vegetables is a rewarding experience, but if you're short on space, you may feel limited with what you can grow. We have dozens of varieties of vegetables that are suited for small spaces and containers. Below are a few of our favorites to help you get started.

EGGPLANT 'PATIO BABY'

A perfect compact selection to add to any container or vegetable garden; early to produce and high yielding; deep purple, egg shaped fruit, produced season long; best harvested when they reach 3 inches; mild flavor, perfect for roasting, dips and salads

TOMATO 'PATIO'

A popular dwarf variety for growing in pots, containers or hanging baskets. Produces delicious 4 oz. fruit on 2 ft. tall plants.

TOMATO 'SWEET N NEAT'

A beautiful, extra compact variety, producing clusters of scarlet cherry tomatoes; sweet and flavorful, perfect for snacking, salads and roasting; superb performance in patio containers, window sills and hanging baskets

CUCUMBER 'PICK A BUSHEL'

A beautiful early maturing, compact bush variety; producing high yields of bright green cucumbers with a lovely sweet and crisp flavor; best tasting when harvested at 6" or smaller; suitable for small gardens and patio containers.

OKRA 'GREEN FINGERS'

This compact bushy variety reaches only 3 feet in height, which makes it ideal for containers. Upright and well branched plants produce tender and spineless 4" ribbed pods. Mild and crunchy, great in stews, soups, preserves and pickled.

SQUASH 'EIGHT BALL'

This is the first round zucchini with deep, intense dark green color. The uniform 3"-4" fruits are shiny, speckled, and grow on vigorous, bushy plants that top out at 30" tall and wide, which make these much smaller than most summer squash plants.

GREAT SMALL SPACE COMBOS

Here are some great combinations for container gardening.

- Better Bush tomato, Sweet Basil, Onion or Bell pepper – Pizza
- Roma tomato, Sweet Basil, and Red onion – Bruschetta
- Better Bush or Roma tomato, Cilantro, and Hot Pepper (Jalapeno or Serrano) – Salsa
- Lettuce with herbs that have the same water requirements
- Eggplant and Green beans
- Spinach, Swiss Chard, and Onions
- Cucumber and lettuce
- Tomato, Basil, and Carrots
- Thyme, Sage, and Rosemary
- Tarragon, Basil and Cilantro
- Creeping Thyme, Lavender, and Marjoram or Sage
- Lavender, Oregano, and Rosemary



Potatoes, Summer Squash, Pole Beans, and Peppers can also be grown in separate containers.

Combinations for 5 Gallon Containers, 12" soil depth

Squash, 1 plant | Pepper, 1-2 plants | Eggplant, 1 plant
Tomato, 1 plant | Turnip, 5 plants | Beets, 5 plants

Combinations for 1 Gallon Containers

If space is limited on your deck, patio, or balcony, here are a few veggies that can be planted in containers as small as a gallon.

Spinach, 2 plants, 5" depth pot | Parsley, 3 plants, 5" depth pot

Radish, 3 plants, 5" depth pot | Lettuce, 3 plants, 5" depth pot

Carrot, 3 plants, pot 2" deeper than carrot length

Cucumber, 1 plant
