Frozen pipes can crack or burst, and the resulting leaks can cost a fortune in repairs. That's why the best time to winterize is before outdoor temperatures drop below freezing. To keep bad weather from freezing pipes and avoid a plumbing headache, refer to the below info on how to protect pipes from freezing in the first place—as well as some helpful tips on how to thaw frozen pipes in a pinch.

WHAT HAPPENS IF YOUR PIPES FREEZE?

Water expands as it freezes, and this process occurs in your plumbing when temperatures drop below 32 degrees F.
Expanding ice puts pressure on both plastic and metal pipes until they cannot hold any longer, at which point they fail. Frozen water pipes that have cracked not only need to be replaced but, if they burst indoors, they can result in serious water damage within hours of thawing.

In addition to opening the door for mold and mildew growth, leaks in cabinets, walls, and floors can cost homeowners thousands in cleanup and repairs.

The types of pipes most susceptible to freezing include outdoor spigots, swimming pool supply lines, and water sprinkler lines, but indoor pipes aren't necessarily safe.

Indoor plumbing in unheated

areas—basements, crawl spaces, attics, garages, exterior walls, or even kitchen cabinets—isn't well protected against freezing temperatures, either.

Seasonal water damage to your home can be avoided altogether if you follow these tips on how to prevent pipes from freezing.

- Know your pipes' and shut-off valve's locations and do preventative maintenance.
- Frozen pipe prevention and prep begins with identifying where your plumbing leads throughout the home and locating your main water shut-off valve. (The exact spot may vary depending on the age of your house, but likely locations are the garage, basement, laundry room, or yard.)
- Each year, it's recommended to have your plumbing and heating systems serviced by pros so you can stay on top of small problems before they turn into larger issues during a freeze.

TO PREVENT YOUR PIPES FROM FROM FREEZING

- Shut off the main water valve and warm the frozen pipes with a hair dryer, heating pad or portable space heater. Don't use a blowtorch. Call a plumber, if needed.
- Keep the nearest faucet turned on while treating a frozen pipe to relieve pressure.
- Drain water from any sprinkler supply lines and disconnect the hose from the outdoor spigot. Use faucet covers for extra protection.
- Wrap the problem pipes with electrical heat tape or foam insulation wrap, especially those in unheated spaces.
- Keep garage doors closed and open kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around the plumbing.
- Move any harmful chemicals out of the reach of children.

- REMINDER: City of Naperville Rules and Regulations prohibit overnight parking (between 2 am and 6 am) on any street.

General home security tips to help you keep your home safe during the winter months:

- Keep your doors and windows always locked.
- Use motion-activated lights to deter burglars.
- Don't leave your valuables in plain sight.
- Consider installing a home security system.

Holiday Shopping Tips

Finally, here are some more safety tips to keep in mind while shopping for Christmas:

- Keep your purse close to your body or your wallet in an inside coat pocket or front pants pocket.
- Don't argue or fight over an item.
- Don't take your money out until asked and don't flash a lot of



- Use only one credit card. Data breaches have occurred in the past at major retailers and credit card companies. Should something similar occur, you can reduce the risk of having multiple cards compromised.
- When you're done shopping, avoid leaving packages in your car. If you must leave packages in your car, make sure they are out of sight and locked in the trunk.
- When walking to your car in a parking lot, stay in well-lit areas and use walkways or crosswalks whenever possible. Keep your keys out and don't linger once you're in your vehicle. Be especially mindful of vehicles that are backing up as well. The NSC reports that nine percent of pedestrian deaths in parking lots and garages are the result of backup incidents.

Please follow the guidelines below to ensure your discarded tree is hauled away. Tree lights can be recycled through hardware stores like The Home Depot and Lowes or websites like Earth 911, which can help you find local or mail-in recycling options.




Remove stands, ornaments, lights, and tinsel



Cut your tree in half if it is over six feet tall

inter can often make gardens appear dull and lifeless, but enhancing your garden for winter ensures that you can enjoy it even when the weather is not ideal.

DO LESS, ENJOY MORE

For those wanting low maintenance yards, most perennials can be left up until spring for winter interest. For



example, rounded coneheads and allium clusters bring texture in lollipops of snow to a stark winter landscape.

Ornamental perennial grasses left to glisten on a frosty day provide much-needed shelter for burrowing bees and beneficial insects.



Save on time and money and let nature take its course. Plants decompose naturally over winter, making your backyard more of a winter wonderland and spring clean up will be simple.

FOR THE BIRDS

Birds and other wildlife frequent spaces that provide food and shelter, giving back winter choruses and entertaining views from inside your warm house. Rugosa Roses develop hips in the fall and persist through winter. These redorange, cherry-sized fruit are a sweet treat for the birds! Planting a flowering

crab, such has Royal Raindrops, offers persistent red fruit



throughout winter and a source of food for robins, cardinals and other songbirds.

FOR-EVER-GREEN

Evergreen trees and shrubs will retain

their foliage throughout winter, adding structure and greenery to your garden. Create a formal hedge or screen an area for privacy with Techny Arborvitae, or add



an eye-catching specimen plant, such as the Acrocona Spruce, which is an excellent choice for a small-scale vertical accent in the garden skyline.

CREATE TEXTURE

Trees with unique or colorful bark, such as the Paperbark Maple can be a focal

point to the winter garden. Shrubs can also provide unique winter textures. Hydrangeas, such as the Invincibelle Ruby, transform to a tapestry of

muted hues with

their soft, papery



their form over the winter landscape.



The key to creating winter interest in your garden is planning for year-round

appeal and incorporating a mix of evergreens, shrubs and perennials that can shine in the winter landscape.

- Workshop D (Geography) Includes learning about different habitats, where animals live, etc.





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Winter Driving

Winter storms, bad weather and sloppy road conditions are inevitable parts of winter in Illinois. Preparing yourself and your vehicle for winter conditions before a weather event is essential. The following are some tips to help you prepare for winter driving.

Stay Alert

- Keep your gas tank close to full.
- If road conditions are hazardous, avoid driving if possible.
- On longer trips, plan enough time to stop to stretch, get something to eat, return calls or text messages, and change drivers or rest if you feel drowsy.

Avoid Risky Driving Behaviors

- Do not text or engage in any activities that may distract you while driving.
- Obey all posted speed limits but drive even slower if necessary for weather conditions.
- Drive sober. Alcohol and drugs impair perception, judgment, motor skills and memory the skills critical for safe and responsible driving.

Drive Carefully in Winter Conditions

- Drive slowly. It's harder to control or stop your vehicle on a slick or snow-covered surface.
- On the road, increase your following distance enough so that you'll have plenty of time to stop for vehicles ahead of you.
- Know whether your vehicle has an antilock brake system and learn how to use it properly. Antilock brake systems prevent your wheels from locking up during braking. If you have antilock brakes, apply firm, continuous pressure to the brake pedal. If you don't have antilock brakes, you may need to pump your brakes if you feel your wheels starting to lock up.

Prepare a Winter Safety Kit for Cars

Carry items in your vehicle to handle common winter drivingrelated tasks, such as cleaning off your windshield, as well as any supplies you might need in an emergency. Here are a few suggestions:

- Snow shovel, broom and ice scraper.
- Abrasive material such as sand or kitty litter in case your vehicle gets stuck in the snow.
- Jumper cables, flashlight and warning devices such as flares and emergency markers.
- Blankets for protection from the cold.
- A cell phone with charger, water, food and any necessary medicine (for longer trips or when driving in lightly populated areas).



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

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
