#### From the President

The warm weather for the last two months has been a challenge to maintain the new landscaping around our entryway monuments. Hopefully, October will provide some relief for the monument landscaping and all our yards.

We have scheduled our Fall General Meeting for Tuesday, November 12, 2024. The meeting will be at the Golf Course Club House. The doors will open at 6:30PM and the meeting will begin at 7:00PM. Please mark your calendar for that date. It is an opportunity to meet your neighbors, provide input to the HOA Board and participate in the planning for the HOA future. We will publish the formal agenda for the Fall Meeting in late October. The agenda will focus on key issues facing the TFHOA:

- 1. We need to have a quorum of twenty-five homeowners at the meeting to have an official meeting to review and approve our 2025 HOA Budget. Twenty-five of the homeowners is only 13% of the homeowners.
- 2. We arrive at this time every year with 25 to 30 percent of the homeowners owing their annual \$100 assessment. We waste time and money attempting to collect the overdue assessments. It may be time to change the way we manage the assessment process. Ideas?
- **3.** We manage homeowner complaints and violations, but we do not have a solution for repeat offenders. Our Bylaws do authorize fines for violations. I think adding fines for repeat violations could improve the results. What do you think?
- **4.** Over the past few years, we have not been following are By-Laws for membership to the Board of Directors. The TFHOA Bylaws require Board elections be held during the Spring General Meeting in April. The combination of April meetings without a quorum, issues like COVID, and a lack of candidates, we have not held Board elections. We need to hold Board elections in 2025. Would you be a viable candidate for the Board, or do you know someone that would be a suitable candidate?
- 5. The Tamarack Fairways HOA is a volunteer organization with no formal offices or administrative support. Implementing fees or violation penalties require daily support. This is the reason for the Board's interest in well-established accounting firms that use software that supports all the functions of an HOA.
- 6. We also need to work on a plan to decorate our monuments for the holiday season.

## Basics of Landscape Design for a Beautiful Garden!

Start your landscape designing in the Fall so you are ready in the Spring! Landscape design requires plenty of imagination, combined with planning and research.

The first step is to explore your goals and priorities for the space. Size and scope are among the first considerations for designing a space. **Scale and proportion** determine how we experience a place. They also inform the selection and placement of other elements.

Designing a thriving landscape relies on the same principles that apply to art. These principles offer guidelines for any creation, including a garden space. These guidelines work on multiple levels.

Landscape design principles are standards by which gardens can be created, measured, evaluated, and discussed. These include proportion, order, simplicity, variety, focalization, repetition, and unity. Each applies to line, form, texture, and color. All of these elements are interconnected.

The entrance visually announces a transition between spaces and draws attention to the opening area and beyond. This gives us directional indicators of welcome and where to head next. Emphasizing the entrance is particularly useful in front of the house. Highlight the front walk, porch, or doorway with a verdant first impression.

**Focalization** relies on landscape features to capture attention. Emphasizing focal points draws the eye in a specific direction and punctuates the space. These punctuations contribute to the order of the overall garden and should reflect the garden's scale.

**Repetition** in landscape design refers to intentionally repeating garden elements that create cohesiveness, rhythm, and order. Repetition comes from the array of columns on an arbor or the consistent use of materials in hardscaped patios. You can also achieve rhythm through walkways, walls, or the repetition of plant material.



**Enclosure** is one of my favorite design concepts because it captures the essence of a garden room. It involves creating a distinct space that relates to other areas (I'm conjuring The Secret Garden here).

**Line** is another key design element. Garden lines are made with paths, bed edges, walls, patios, pond edges – basically, any feature with a linear aspect that creates an edge between two materials.

**Color** is one of the most exciting parts of garden-making. It's also one of the most impactful tools for **creating the aesthetic** mood and unifying the landscape.


In summary, anyone is capable of designing a beautiful garden. Consider your garden's purpose and incorporate the key design elements to carry it through. Observe what you love in other spaces and use them as guides, from specific plants and features to materials and the overall layout.

Incorporating landscape principles helps you harness unity in the garden. A garden is unified when the overall look is cohesive and all other components create a collective design and experience.

## HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS!!!



- Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you. Always WALK and don't run from house to house.
- Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.
- Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
- Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.
- Only walk on sidewalks whenever possible, or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shows to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
- Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.
- Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult. Only visit well-lit houses. Never accept rides from strangers.
- Never walk near lit candles or luminaries. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.





## ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE UPDATE

Living in Illinois means homeowners have to always be prepared for changes in the weather. The climate encapsulates all four seasons in Illinois, and staying ahead of the game can save a homeowner thousands of dollars and days and weeks of unwanted challenges or issues. Winter is a beautiful season, with falling snow and cooler temperatures. But it can also be fierce, with arctic-cold temperatures, ice and risks of damage to homes.

It may feel overwhelming to think about preparing a home for winter, but it doesn't have to be. There are a number of simple steps to follow that can be done on the weekend or in spare time. The first thing to know is that water damage, particularly damage linked to frozen and burst pipes, accounts for a major share of homeowner's insurance claims. During the winter months, it's a good idea to wrap your pipes and keep the heat at a temperature of 65 degrees or higher. Also, know where the water shutoff valve is located so that it can be quickly shut off in an emergency.

## THERE ARE A NUMBER OF \*TIPS TO HELP GET YOUR HOUSE READY FOR WINTER IN ILLINOIS:

- Protect indoor pipes. Pay special attention to basements, where over one-third of all burst pipes occur.
- Insulate the attic or crawl space.
- Service the furnace and chimney, and annual inspections should be standard practice.
- Remove and store all window screens. Install glass storm windows, creating an insulating layer of air between the window and cold weather.
- Repair loose roofing shingles. Snow is heavy, and it can cause shingles to lift and let water leak into the home.
- Clean and inspect gutters.
- Repair loose or broken patio stones.
- Remove any dead or ailing tree limbs.
- Secure outdoor water sources, including draining any garden hoses before the first frost. Remove the hose from the spigot.
- Mark garden beds, paths, and driveways to assist with snow shoveling.
- Re-caulk windows and doors, sealing any gaps.
- Reverse ceiling fans, which helps circulate warm air.
- Drain fuel from gas powered engines, such as a lawn mower.
- Check on insurance coverage to avoid any unwanted surprises.
- Prevent door locks from freezing in super-cold climates by spraying a powered-graphite lubricant in each lock.
- Tidy up gardens and help prevent insects from hiding out.
- Mulch flower beds.
- Keep your deck clean; apply sealer if needed.
- Check on snowblower to make sure it is working properly.
- Bring in outdoor plants, furniture and grills.
- Cover the water heater with an insulation blanket.
- Install a programmable thermostat to allow custom temperatures to be set.
- Change batteries and test smoke detectors.

We all know that attractive and well maintained landscaping provides pride in ownership, and shows that we're good neighbors. And, a well maintained exterior and landscaping makes it much easier to sell your home, when you are ready to do so.

If you are proposing exterior projects this year, please don't forget to fill out an ABC approval form, found on our Tamarack Fairways website tamarackfairways.org, and then navigate to the Project Approval section where you need to fill out the approval form.

#### TAKE AWAY THE **OPPORTUNITY TO BE SCAMMED**

Frauds and scams continue to be big business for criminals. From January 2024 thru July 2024, NPD has taken 82 scam reports for a loss of \$4,548,968. The most common types of scams this year have been tech support, Facebook Marketplace, fake warrants, phishing, and investment scams. Investment scams resulted in the largest dollar losses. Remember, do not give out personal or financial information to people you do not know. In addition, be aware that bill collectors and government agencies will never demand payment via cryptocurrency or gift cards.

#### **Red Flags/Common Denominators** of Frauds and Scams

- Scammers make you think the matter is urgent and you need to act immediately.
- Payment is demanded by gift cards, cryptocurrency (e.g. Bitcoin) or through money transfers like MoneyGram and Western Union.
- Callers use intimidation to make you think you have done something wrong.
- Emails and texts often contain misspellings and grammatical errors.
- The offer seems too good to be true.
- You have been asked to give out personal secure information such as passwords or pins or allow remote access to your computer.



Naperville's Municipal Code prohibits the parking of any vehicle on city streets or alleys between 2 and 5 a.m. The Naperville Police Department enforces this ordinance proactively as resources allow and in response to complaints.

Currently, a vehicle may only be parked on a city street or alley overnight if:

- The driveway the vehicle is registered to is visibly in the process of being replaced, repaired, or seal coated.
- Temporary permission has been granted by the police department.
- The vehicle clearly displays a hangtag issued by a homeowner's association (HOA) participating in the City's Overnight Parking Program and is parked in an area designated in the Municipal Code as exempt from the overnight parking ordinance.
